Online platforms for networks & Communities of Practice (COPs)

"Communities of practice are groups of people who share a concern, a set of problems or a passion about a topic and who deepen their knowledge and expertise by interacting on an ongoing basis"¹

The literature shows that 'investment in technology offers no guarantees for gathering collective intelligence'.² Using existing networks, where people already know each other, and combining technology with face-to-face engagement, is a more successful approach. On the next pages are some existing platforms you might want to consider.

It is recommended that you:

- Establish a code of conduct and identify priorities
- Select a technology that is based on user need (consider digital literacy skills)
- Select something intuitive and user-friendly
- Have at least one dedicated site administrator (two is preferable)
- Post regularly
- Document lessons learned³

Levels of participation will vary within the group, but the coordinators should take responsibility for ensuring the site stays vibrant and up-to-date.

FutureNHS Collaboration Platform	A secure online hub originally developed for vanguards, new care model teams and other stakeholders. Includes "workstreams" where registered users can store and access documents, have discussions, collaborate and learn.
Yammer	A kind of corporate social media – groups can be created with those internal, and external to the organisation, providing the administrator's organisation has access to Yammer through Office365 https://www.yammer.com/
NHS Networks	A free NHS approved networking site (not just for NHS staff). Create your own network (group) sites or join existing networks (groups). https://www.networks.nhs.uk/
SharePoint	Web-based collaborative file-sharing platform, community-type sites can be created if the network administrator has access to Office365. Good for version control and document management. https://support.office.com/en-gb/article/What-is-SharePoint-97b915e6-651b-43b2-827d-fb25777f446f
MSTeams	Microsoft Teams is part of the Office365 suite. It is a chat-based workspace where teams can collaborate, share documents and videoconference.
